Winter Ladder

Davis Cup Madrid



This past spring, Helen and I learned that the Davis Cup finals were going to be in a different format this year. All of the final matches would be held in Madrid during the week of November 18th. The Davis Cup is the men's World Cup of Tennis. Teams from 133 nations competed in the event this year, with the final 18 competing in Madrid for the Championship. Each country plays in a "tie" that consists of two singles and one doubles match. The rules require each team's top ranked players play each other, and their second highest ranked players play each other. This results in great matches that are more typical of a major ATP or Grand Slam final.

If you're even a casual tennis fan, you will know that 2019 has been a great year for Canadian tennis. The breakout star has been Bianca Andreescu, with her incredible year capped off with both a Rogers Cup win at home, followed by a US Open victory in a great Rogers Cup rematch against Serena Williams. But our Canadian men have been incredible as well. Denis Shapovalov and Felix Auger-Aliassime have had breakout years. Shapo is 15th on the ATP Tour rankings and Felix has reached 21st. These two young stars are joined by Davis Cup veteran Vasek Pospisil, who, coming back from back surgery is ranked 150th in singles. Vasek's current rank doesn't reflect his Davis Cup performance however. He really seems to rise to the occasion when playing for our country. Rookie Brayden Schnur rounded out our squad,

with Frank Dancevic as captain and Daniel Nestor as doubles coach.

Helen and I made the decision to fly to Madrid to support our team and watch some great tennis. We shared the details of this event with some of our tennis friends, and before we knew it, we had a group of six Waterloo Tennis Club members signed up. Joining us was Sean and Sheri Gartner, and Greg and Kristyn Clairmont.

We knew that a Davis Cup final was going to be different from any other tennis tournament we'd attended. Fans cheer after every point. Non stop. It was going to be loud. It was going to be very patriotic. So we went shopping for lots of Canadian shirts, hats and flags.

We arrived in Madrid and prepared for our first tie against the formidable Italian squad. Tennis Canada had arranged a pre-match rally at a small pub across the street from the "Magic Box" site. This was a fantastic way for fans to get to know each other, and to learn the cheers. The head cheerleader was Tennis Canada's Tulla Bateman. She came armed with noise makers, cow bells and there were red Tennis Canada t-shirts for sale. This became our ritual before each match, and we would all march across the street singing and chanting our Canadian cheers. We made quite an impression!

Tennis Canada CEO Michael Downey and VP Professional Events Gavin Ziv gave short speeches about the team, and the importance the fans are to their game. Downey pointed out we had Canadians from all over the country in

Madrid. It was a great testament to how passionate Canadians are about their tennis.



I was hopeful, but not overly confident that we would prevail. I learned at the pre-match rally that Felix was still nursing an ankle injury and would not be playing. The first match was Vasek Pospisil versus "Fabulous" Fabio Fognini. The fact that Fognini is ranked 12th and Pospisil is ranked 150th should have told the story of this match. For the first time ever at a sporting event, I really felt that the support of the crowd had an effect on the outcome. We were lifting Pospisil after every point, win or loss. We were out there with him, helping him push through incredibly tough odds. And true to his Davis Cup form, Vasek played an unbelievably gutsy match, besting Fognini in two sets (7-6, 7-5).

Next up was Shapo taking on powerhouse Matteo Berrettini (ranked 8th). This was a real battle. There were incredibly long rallies and after splitting sets, Shapo pulled off a victory with a 3rd set tiebreak win. We had won our first tie in the finals! But because the results of the 3rd set may come into play if there was a tie in our group, Team Canada sent Shapo and Vasek out against Berrettini and Fognini. We lost this match, but won the tie.

Tuesday night we were playing the US. I really wanted us to win this one! Pospisil played Reilly Opelka (ranked 36th). Opelka is a giant, standing at 6' 11" and he has a booming serve. But once again, the giant killer Pospisil toppled Opelka in two sets, both ending in a tie breaker.

Shapo then took on Taylor Fritz (ranked 32nd) and had a good match, winning 7-6, 6-3. We had beaten the US and were now assured a spot in the quarter finals! The final doubles match didn't matter, so we decided to all head off for food.

Helen and I now had a decision to make. We had originally planned to fly home on Saturday. But our boys were playing so well. We pulled the trigger and changed our flights so we could be there for the Final, hoping our good fortune would continue. And worst case, we'd see some great tennis even if Canada didn't make it all the way.

The quarter final match against Australia was going to be tough. My voice was feeling the effects of two nights of shouting and cheering. Fortunately, Spain is known for great wine with restorative powers (ok, I might be making up that last part).

We also wanted to play some tennis on Spain's famous red clay. So Helen, Sean and I went to the Cuidad del la Raqueta for a couple of hours of fun. The red clay is so much finer than Har-Tru. But it gets everywhere!



In preparation for the Aussie match, I created a new cheer, sung to the tune of "If you're happy and you know it". It was for use when playing one of my least favourite players – Nick Kyrgios. Some of his antics are just beyond juvenile, and I'm not a fan. The new cheer refers to a particularly egregious antic: "If you're grumpy and you know it, chuck a chair!".

Sadly (or maybe fortunately), Kyrgios was not in the lineup for our tie. Pospisil started the night against John Millman (ranked 48th). Pospisil served well and kept getting everything back and triumphed 7-6, 6-4. Next up was Shapo against Alex De Minaur (ranked 18th). This would be a very tough battle, and Shapo pressed hard but lost in 3 sets 6-3, 3-6, 7-5. Our pass to the semi-finals was dependant on Shapo and Pospisil beating John Peers and Jordan Thompson in the doubles match.

This was a spectacular display of doubles. The ball ricocheted from side to side and we cheered along with every point. We had done it! We beat Australia in the doubles 6-4, 6-4 and had a spot in the Davis Cup semi-finals against Russia!

I wanted us to beat Russia even more than I wanted us to beat the US. But this would require a lot of skill and perseverance. Pospisil was riding high on what was arguably his best week of tennis ever, and he found an even higher gear against Andrey Rublev (ranked 23rd). During one dramatic point, Pospisil fell near the post at the umpire's chair and cut his leg. He battled through the pain (and blood) but lost 6-4, 6-4. He needed stitches after the match. It was up to Shapo to keep our Davis Cup dreams alive. His match against Karen

Khachanov (ranked 17th) was a loud and stressful 3 setter. The Canadian fans definitely outnumbered the Russian ones, and we were much louder. Shapo fought hard and ultimately delivered with a 6-4, 4-6, 6-4 win. It was once again down to the doubles.

Pospisil demonstrated his leadership and experience in Davis Cup in this critical match against Khachanov and Rubelev. After exchanging sets, it came down to the third set. And in a tie breaker that had us on the verge of a nervous breakdown, we prevailed! Canada had just made history, and we were there to see it, and participate. We were going to the Davis Cup Final for the first time in our nation's history.



As the week progressed, the size of our Canadian contingent reduced. Some had to get back home, others had travel plans beyond Madrid. Some tried to get their flights changed but could not make it work. The remaining ~70 of us would have to make up for our departed compatriots.

We celebrated at one of our favourite local restaurants Teitu and got some rest. Sunday was going to be a big day. Canada versus Spain. In Spain. We were going to be outnumbered. In my mind, Canada had already won. We had played great tennis against much higher ranked players, and our passionate group of supporters was with them for every swing of the racquet.

Throughout the week we were getting messages from friends and family back home saying they had seen us on TV.

On Sunday, we met up with Sean and Sheri (the Clairmonts moved on to a sunnier locale to finish their week). We headed off to the prematch rally at the usual meeting spot and enjoyed the special bonding that Canadians abroad experience when attending a big sporting event. We applied (temporary) tattoos to our arms and held our flags high as we marched to the Magic Box.

We met briefly before the Shakira opening concert with another Waterloo Tennis Club member – Kashia Radwan-Cho. As an ITF Silver Badge umpire, Kasia was working as a review official for the Davis Cup Finals. Whenever there was a challenge to a line call, the review official would oversee the Hawkeye team to ensure the correct incident was being reviewed, and the proper call was made.



The Shakira concert was entertaining. The stage was removed pretty quickly, and the formal introductions of the officials and teams commenced. My voice was pretty much gone before the finals, but I still gave it my best. It was time for the anthems. I can't count the number of times I've heard our anthem, but I

will never forget this one. It was the loudest I've ever sang it, and, arm in arm with Helen, Sheri and Sean we sang our hearts out with the rest of the Team Canada. It was the most patriotic moment I've ever experienced. We were so proud of our team for reaching the finals, and we wanted them to hear us.

Spain's team is tough. Roberto Bautista Agut is ranked 9th in the world. And he was having a very tough emotional week. His father passed away at the start of the week, but he returned to his team to help them win the Davis Cup. Obviously, everyone felt for him.

Spain's other singles player is a lad named Rafael Nadal. He's quite good. He's won a few tournaments. And he's won over \$119M USD. He's tough to beat.

For the first time of the week, Felix Auger-Aliassime was going to be playing in the first match. Vasek Pospisil was feeling the toll of a tough week. But he still wanted to play. I'm sure a lot of you watched this match, and the next one between Shapovalov and Nadal. It was fantastic tennis.



Felix played very well, but no one was going to beat Bautista Agut that day. Felix took him to a tie breaker in the first set before falling behind a break and losing the second set. But he was a winner as far as we were concerned. He represented himself, his team and his country with class. The entire team did.

At match point, Bautista Agut looked to the sky and pointed. What a moment. I'm sure his dad was very proud. You couldn't help but be happy for him.



Now it was up to Shapo to try and keep our Championship hopes alive by defeating Nadal. Helen and I have seen Nadal play many times, including here in the Magic Box at the Madrid Open. But we weren't playing on the famous red clay. This was hard court. Surely that would help Shapo. Our cheering grew louder, and squeakier in my case. All week the crowd had been very respectful of the players. When they started into their service motion, the crowd was quiet. But sometimes it took longer for the crowd to be guiet than the chair umpire desired. Especially when a Canadian player had won the previous point. We saw a few arms waved in our direction from the chair, as well as hearing "Thank you, players are ready". On a couple of occasions, Sean and I would shout "Sooorrrryyyy" back. All in good fun.

But in the Final, a few of the Spanish fans were inexplicably shouting during their own player's serve. Strange, but certainly better than them doing it during one of our player's serve.

Nadal was Nadal. He won the first set 6-3. But the second set was different. Shapo had him shaken. He took Nadal to a tie breaker, where Nadal used all his remaining challenges. Shapo pressed hard, but you don't get to Nadal's level without being able to get yourself out of a hole. And that's what he did. Recap of 2019 UW OUA varsity season

The 2019-20 University of Waterloo varsity season was one of the more satisfying and successful ones for the school for almost a decade. The men ended a 10-year team medal drought by winning the bronze medal at this past season's Ontario Universities Athletic Association (OUA) and while the women did not bring home any hardware, this year's team was a much stronger team than those of the recent past. More impressive was that the 2019-20 teams consisted of almost an equal mix of rookies and returning members - four rookies out of 10 on the men's team and five of eight for the women.

The women had a 2-3 win/loss record after the regular season, with one of the wins being a notable one over York. They had a good win, (6-1), over a much improved Brock women's team. The Waterloo losses were against power houses, Toronto and Western. The third loss was a close one to McMaster, (3-4) which was their first match of the season and the debuts of four rookies out of the six players playing that day. Nerves and inexperience, for sure were factors that day but happily the women settled down and played better as the season progressed. Unfortunately, the loss to McMaster would have a far-reaching effect; it resulted in the Warriors having to play York in the first round at the season-ending OUA championships due to the seeding based on the regular season results. The Lions were obviously out for revenge evidenced by their aggressive play and behaviour. Unfortunately the Warriors, were not at full strength because a couple of key players had only just recovered from the flu the week before and were not at their optimum form against the pumped up Lions. Waterloo lost 1-6 with rookie Mackenzie Dumais at no. 6 preventing a clean sweep.

Overall, the women's team this past season was one of the stronger and certainly deepest Waterloo has had in a while with several very competent players with great attitudes, on and off the court. If they continue to play and practice, there is no reason why they won't be able to do even better next year.

The men by virtue of their 4-1 win-loss record after the regular season, were the second seeds behind the Toronto Blues who were seeded number 1 at the OUA's season-ending tournament. The seedings of these two schools placed them automatically in the semi-finals. Waterloo awaited the winner of

Western and Brock which predictably was Western. The Mustangs were in full force and form against Waterloo beating the Warriors 6-1. Like the women, the Mustangs were primed for revenge having been beaten by the Warriors in the last match of the regular season. While it was a disappointment for the Warriors, it was not completely a surprise as the Mustangs fielded their strongest team at the OUAs which was not the case in the regular season game. The Western team continued their fine form in the final against Toronto to win the OUA title 5-2.

Undaunted by the loss to the Mustangs the Warriors turned their focus and efforts to the bronze medal match the following day which was to be contested between them and the York Lions who had lost to Toronto in the other semi-final. The men were able to fend off the Lions with spirited and determined play despite losing the opening doubles point. The Warriors went on to win five of the six singles matches to win 5-2 and their first team medal in a decade. As a team, it was the most successful year since 2009 for the men when they finished with silver medals. As well, in 2015 the Warriors and coach had a banner year winning individual medals and honours. The hope is that this year's success will continue to establish the men's team as a perennial top three contender. With four key senior players graduating after this year, it is encouraging to note that three rookies, and a second - year team member played the final match alongside three seniors. The experience gained this season will no doubt be invaluable to the younger ones if they are to lead the team to higher achievements in the future.

Very fine performances over the course of the season were provided by all members of the team notably freshmen, Pavle Milic who played at no. 1 and was voted OUA Rookie of the Year and selected as one of six OUA all stars; Alex Oancea at no. 2 was a rock throughout the entire season in singles and second-year Eitan Rozin at no. 4, who played with growing confidence in both singles and doubles as the season progressed.

Though the Warriors will be losing five experienced players in total (four men and one woman) after this season, the future is promising as hopefully this year's results will attract many more talented fine men and women student/athletes to study and play here.

A big thank you to the asst. Coaches Nancy Baloescu, Matt Buckley, Filbert Nghiem and Robert Rotaru who gave of what time they could spare from their own busy schedules to help with the training of the players and development of the varsity program. Without their assistance, the program would not

be able to run as well and successfully. On this note, this year may well have been my swan song too, from the position of Head Coach. I have been ten years with the teams, nine of them as Head Coach. It has been a learning and often very gratifying experience for me working with the young men and women, many away from home for the first time and to see them develop into more responsible, aware and confident young adults by the time they graduate four years later. It has been a privilege for me to share that journey of growth with them.




